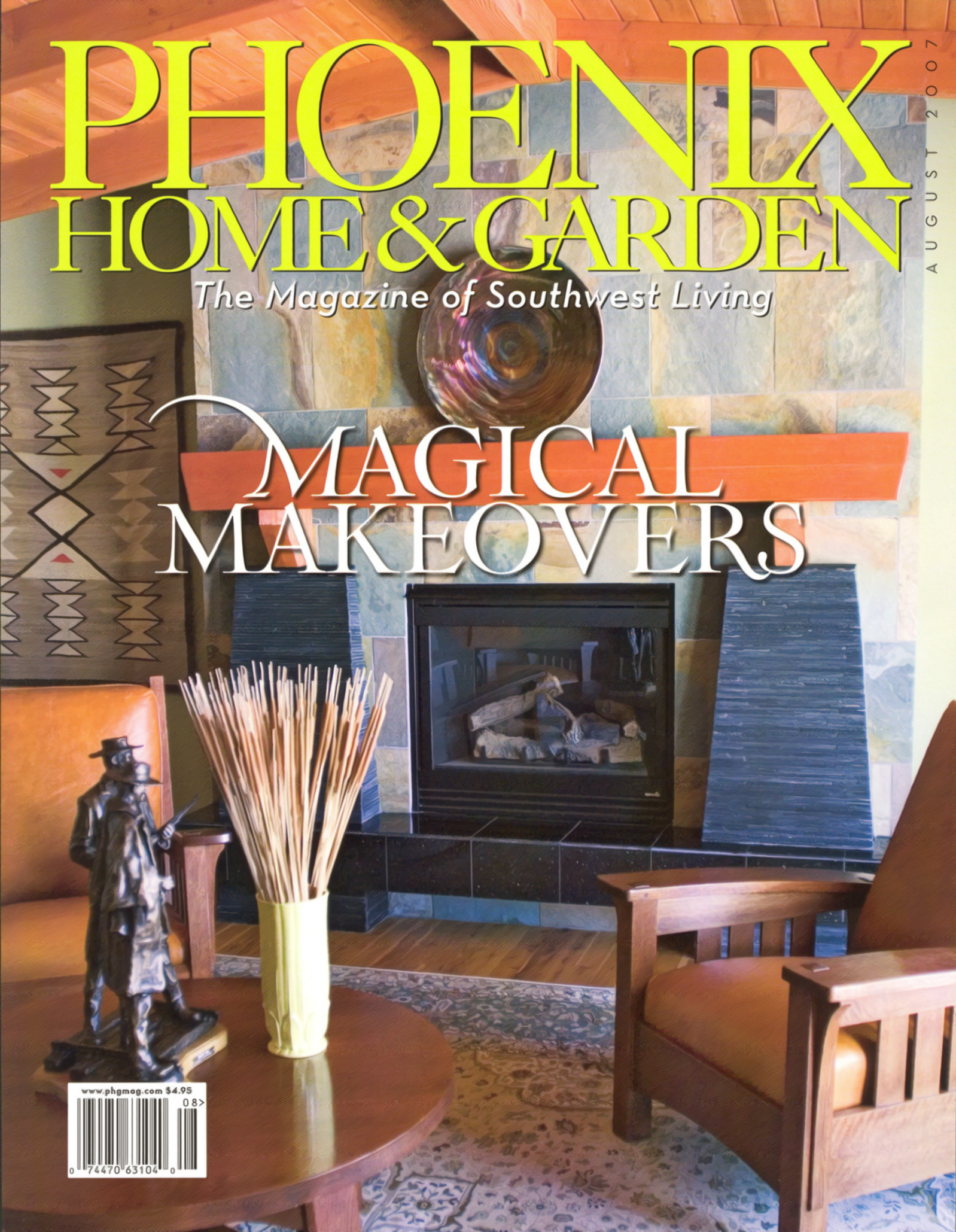

DESERT ARTS & CRAFTS

A love of craftsmanship
drives a Tucson couple
to rebuild their home

Opposite: The foyer of this Tucson home, with its large Tiffany-style chandelier, announces an Arts & Crafts look. A reproduction of Frederic Remington's *Bronco Buster* sculpture and a painting by Phill Nethercott titled *Slick Rock Sunrise* add Southwestern reference.

This page, clockwise from top: A citrine geode underscores the organic nature of a stacked-stone wall. ■ A collection of Arts & Crafts-style ceramics accents a hallway. ■ Warm shades of Arizona slate flooring extend from the foyer to the main hallway; the arched ceiling features tongue-and-groove mahogany. At the end of the hallway, a log-cabin quilt from the 1860s serves as an engaging focal point.





This page: The living room is centered around slat-back Stickley chairs in a 1908 design. Two obelisks of stacked black onyx slabs anchor the fireplace, which features a fir mantel and Arizona slate surround. A vintage Navajo weaving from the 1920s is displayed on the wall.

Opposite: In the dining room, the mahogany ceiling was inspired by one seen in a magazine. The dining set includes a modern-day mahogany Stickley table and antique Stickley side chairs. The muted tones of the Tiffany-style chandelier add a historic touch.



In the kitchen (this page and opposite), beadboard-faced cabinets—some designed with display areas—were painted a subtle sage green, and an antique British Colonial teakwood piece functions as an island. A mammoth antique hutch and sideboard from India (top right) once were a single piece. For extra display space, the homeowners had them separated and the hutch equipped with matching braces. Furniture-style cabinetry with shapely feet (bottom right) and a farmhouse sink (bottom left) create a homey atmosphere. Arts & Crafts touches include antique brass hardware on the cabinetry and ornamental copper accent tiles decorating the backsplash.







The master suite (this page and opposite) has a muted color palette—walls, bedding and the Arizona slate flooring display tones of tan, brown, gray and soft blue. This neutral backdrop showcases a collection of Western art, including the painting (opposite) that the homeowners purchased at an auction. Wood furnishings, such as the vanity in the master bath (above left and right), are found throughout, as is wood wainscoting.
